rivate detective agencies are now hiring college students, armed with networking skills and tech knowledge, to help them crack cases. There are over 300 licensed private investigation agencies in the city, and most of them employ students on a freelance basis.

Private detective agencies are the got option for people who want guarded background checks on prospective brides and grooms, and employees. However, even engineering and commerces the engineering and commerce stu-dents apply for the 'job' and internships.

Both boys and girls, aged between 18 and 25 years, are hired since that is when they are mature enough to understand the case and can enter pubs. Many engineering students help in cracking cybercrime-related cases. Cameras, recorders, microphones are given to them and they are taught how to handle these equipments.

They are sent on the field only after training and briefing. 'We tell them to reveal their identifities when caught but never give out the client's details. We ask them to call us when things go wrong.' Divynsh Narway a prusite detail.
